

## 4-H DAIRY QUIZ BOWL AND SKILL-A-THON SATURDAY FEBRUARY 2, 2013

Entries for the Wisconsin 4-H Dairy Quiz bowl contest on Saturday February 2, 2013

are due on January 15, 2013. The event will be held at **Portage High School** in Portage, WI with registration for the event starting at 9:45am. The cost for the event will be \$10 per team.

\*NEW THIS YEAR\* Senior participants will also be eligible to compete in a Skill-A-Thon contest the same day as the Quiz Bowl Contest. Details for this new event are still being worked out so please check back to the Wisconsin Dairy Youth website in mid November for more information on this event. In the dairy bowl, contestants will answer a variety of questions about dairy cattle. All questions will come from the sources listed in the official dairy bowl rules which can be found on the Wisconsin Dairy Youth website at www.uwex.edu/ ces/dairyyouth/qbowl.php Teams compete in a double elimination format by giving oral answers to questions posed by the moderator. There will be three divisions; Junior, Senior and Mixed which may be composed of both Junior and Senior aged participants. Junior participants must be aged 9-13 on January 1, 2013 and Senior participants must be aged 14-18 on January 1, 2013. The winning dairy bowl team will represent Wisconsin at the Invitational 4-H youth Dairy Bowl Contest at the North American International Livestock Exposition (N.A.I.L.E) in Louisville, KY. 



Priority selection will be given to first time applicants; alumni are welcome to apply and will be assigned on a first-come, first-served basis after registration closes on January 11. ALL applicants will be notified of their status (confirmed or on waiting list) shortly thereafter. An expectation form and a

health form are due February 1.

Program details: During this program, you will travel on a motor coach; sleep overnight on the coach on the return trip; eat in restaurants and a camp cafeteria, share same-gender sleeping and restroom facilities, sleep in double or bunk beds, work with a team of 12-15 similar aged youth to help them solve problems, and read a script aloud during a mock space mission under the guidance of an adult advisor. Youth will be under the direct supervision of adult 4-H volunteers, Wisconsin 4-H staff, Space Camp staff adult counselors and WI 4-H youth counselors, Adult Advisors are assigned at a ratio of 1:10 youth. A Youth Counselor will be assigned to each youth camper lodging room; at least one adult of the same gender will be housed per floor. Both genders will be housed on the same floor. The health staff is a Wisconsin 4-H adult volunteer who has first aid/CPR training. Participants may be able to experience some or all of the following activities: train like the pioneers of Mercury, Gemini, and Apollo; tumble and spin in a Multi-Axis Trainer; float on air in a 5-Degrees of Freedom Chair; walk like Apollo astronauts in a 1/6<sup>th</sup> Gravity Chair; experience a world without friction in the MMU - Manned Maneuvering Unit; explore the past, present and future of space flight; and experience a giant screen IMAX® theater. Activities may also include large group games and running which allow personal contact with other campers; walking or standing for several hours on concrete floors or sidewalks; climbing on an indoor climbing wall with safety equipment; swimming in a hotel pool with non-lifeguard trained Adult Advisors present; writing; public speaking; and performing skits. #### What opportunities exist?

Citizenship Washington Focus bus trips to Washington, D.C. (June-July);

National 4-H Congress in Atlanta, Georgia (late November);

Space Camp bus trip to Huntsville, Alabama (late April);

International trips to Argentina, Australia, Finland, Japan, Korea, Mexico, or Tanzania (summer).

#### Who can apply?

Applicants must be at least 21 years old (25 for some international experiences) at time of trip.

Applicants must have completed the Wisconsin 4-H Youth Protection program and currently be registered as 4-H leaders.

#### What are the expectations of Adult Advisors?

Applicants must be in good physical condition to withstand rigors associated with the trip. Expect much walking on hard surfaces, handling luggage, and sharing a sleeping room. Sleep deficit is common.

Space Camp and Citizenship Washington Focus (CWF) leaders can expect long periods of riding on a bus.

CWF participants usually experience high temperatures with humidity in Washington D.C.

Public speaking is required.

Adult leaders must work cooperatively with fellow Advisor team members and remain with the delegation at all times during the trip.

Adult leaders are required to submit a report and evaluation upon completion of the program.

#### <u>Participation at scheduled teleconference or in-person orientations is mandatory.</u>

#### How much time does it require?

Advisors are required to attend both Adult Advisor and delegate orientations.

Preparatory time and time to complete a follow-up report and evaluation must also be scheduled.

Most trips are for three to seven days but international trips are four to eight weeks, depending on the program.

#### What does it cost?

Registration, lodging and travel expenses are covered for national trips; some meals are at the Adult Advisor's expense. Selected international Advisors will need passports and physicians' reports; some fees apply.

#### What are the criteria for Advisor selection?

Motivation: An applicant's first and foremost reason for applying must be motivated by a genuine desire to lead a youth group, attending to the group's welfare and education, <u>not</u> for a vacation or to experience a son or daughter's trip.

Experience: An applicant must have previous experience chaperoning local, county, district or state overnight or extended trips, whether for 4-H, school, Scouts, or other youth groups.

Gender: Youth must be represented by adults of their same gender.

Geographic location: Bus trips for CWF and Space Camp originate in Eau Claire where an Advisor is needed at the initial loading site for each trip. If a leader is not from that area, it should be noted on the application if he/she is willing to board/disembark at Eau Claire. National Congress requires Advisors at three or four widely dispersed airports.

Interpersonal communication: Leaders must be team players who work together.

Leadership ability. Effective teams unify a variety of talents: organization, "people skills", guiding....

Previous travel experience: National Congress leaders must have flight experience; international Advisors must have traveled internationally at least once.

Sense of humor! A vital part of state and national 4-H trips is having fun, both for youth and adults.

#### How do I apply?

A complete application must be submitted before March 1 (January 1 for international trips).

A county 4-H Youth Development Agent's reference is required. Other references may be required.

All applicants will be notified of their status in early March.

Each trip has a different focus with different desired attributes for leaders. If someone doesn't fit into one position, they might be great elsewhere. Advisor applicants will experience some wonderful hot competition for a few positions! If you are not selected this year, please don't be discouraged! Apply again next year!

## 4-H Shooting Sports Certification Training



To serve as a Shooting Sports Leader, 4-H leaders must complete the Youth Protection process, be at least 18 years old, and participate in at least one state-level 4-H Leader Training Shooting Sports certification in the discipline in which they are providing supervision. If an adult leader is not certified, he/she cannot provide hands-on or safety instruction without a certified leader being present.

Certification workshops are not designed to teach volunteers how to use archery equipment or shoot a firearm, but are designed to teach adults how to conduct safe, supervised, shooting experiences for 4-H members enrolled in the project. Therefore, only adults who have experience in safely handling archery equipment and/or firearms should enroll in these certification workshops.

In 2012, there was three certification workshops offered—one Eastern, one Western and one Central. In the future, we plan to offer the Central certification every year in the fall. Coordinator, Pistol and Muzzleloader will only be offered at the annual Central certification in addition to Archery, Rifle and Shotgun. For 2013, we will offer certification workshops in the north and south as well as the central area.

# REVISED CERTIFCATION POLICY—Add an additional certification with a one-day/eight-hour/two-year option:

**Starting in 2012 and in the future:** If you complete a 12-hour certification, you may be eligible to add an additional discipline certification by attending an eight-hour Discipline certification only. For example, if you attended the Eastern-Area 12-hour certification workshop in April 2012 (which included the four-hour Guidelines session on Friday evening and an eight-hour range session on Saturday) and then attend the Central Area certification in September, you only need attend the eight-hour Saturday range session to be certified in another discipline.

If you add an additional certification after attending a 12-hour workshop in 2012, you have up to two years from the date that you attended the workshop to add another discipline certification using the eight-hour option. As long as you add another eight-hour certification within two years of your last certification, you do not need to repeat a 12-hour certification. If two years expire before your next certification workshop date, the 12-hour certification workshop is required. Those attending certifications for the first time must attend the 12-hour certification workshop before they can be considered eligible for the eight-hour option.

# Here's What's Cookin' December Recipe From the Kitchen of Marcia Meshbesher Vernon County Fair Cultural Arts Superintendent



#### Chicken and Dumplings

#### **Ingredients**

2 pounds skinless, boneless, chicken thighs, cut into pieces.

2 cups diagonally cut celery

2 cups cup up carrots

2 cups chopped onion

1/2 teaspoon dried thyme

12 sprigs parsley

4 bay leaves

12 cups chicken broth

2 1/2 cups flour

5 tablespoons chopped parsley

1 1/4 teaspoons baking powder

1 1/4 teaspoons salt

1 1/4 cups milk

#### **Instructions**

Heat large pan. Coat with cooking spray.
Cook chicken until browned. Remove chicken and add celery, and next 5 ingredients, through bay leaf and sauté until onion is tender. Return chicken to pan and cook another minute. Add broth and bring to boil. Cover, reduce heat and simmer for 30 minutes. Comb flour, parsley, baking powder, salt in bowl and then add milk, just stirring until moist, then add by small teaspoonful into broth mixture. Cover and simmer 10 minutes or until dumplings done. Discard parsley springs and bay leaf and serve. Makes about 16 plus cups. (Freezes well)
