Countywide 4-H Meeting Attendance Requirement

All 4-H families recently received a letter about the new minimum 4-H club meeting attendance policy which goes into effect with this year's 4-H enrollment.

Early in 2016 the 4-H Leader Parent Federation took steps to ensure consistent participation in 4-H by proposing a 50% minimum club attendance policy. Each 4-H family was polled for their thoughts on such a policy. Overwhelmingly, 4-H families support this policy (80% of respondents). This county wide attendance policy will take effect in as you enroll or re-enroll in 4-H this year. This will not overrule current requirements a 4-H club has in place, unless the 50% requirement is more than what a 4-H club currently has in effect. The clubs have a right to set more stringent requirement if they choose. This policy change may impact your children's eligibility to show at the Vernon County and State Fairs as a 4-H member.

Working together, the Leader Parent Federation thanks you for helping make Vernon County 4-H a valued educational experience for your children.

Notes from the 4-H Leader Parent Federation: Adult volunteers serve our 4-H youth in many ways. Please consider the following opportunities.



Recognition Committee new member needed – 3 year term, starts this fall Focus: Assist in the annual selection process for 4-H youth award trips and Key award recipients

The Recognition Committee is a subcommittee of the Vernon County Leader/Parent Federation. Any 4-H volunteer in good standing may serve as a recognition committee member. There are three representatives serving staggered three year terms so that a new member is joining the committee each year. The committee typically meets 2-3 times each year- after the application deadline to score paperwork and set up interview times, to conduct interviews and then to wrap up the year if needed.

Scholarship Committee new member needed – 3 year term, starts spring of 2017 Focus: Assist in the annual selection process for 4-H Scholarship recipients

The Scholarship Committee shall consist of three members serving a term of three years. Thus, a new member will be selected each year by the Federation. The person with the most seniority shall serve as chairperson of the committee. Their responsibilities will include public relations, making scholarship forms available to applicants, naming the Selection Committee, and revising the form when deemed necessary. Please note: The Scholarship Committee may not be the same as the Scholarship Selection Committee. It is possible that an individual may be on both, but no parent of an applicant or anyone with close ties to an applicant shall be on the Selection Committee. The committee typically meets 1-2 times per year.

Leader Parent Federation Officers Needed – 2 year terms

--4-H Adult Volunteers with knowledge and experience in our county 4-H program, along with a willingness to learn, are well positioned to enjoy serving on the Federation.

--An interest in serving all aspects of the county 4-H program, as opposed to a specific project, best serves our 4-H youth.

--Consistent attendance is needed at the monthly 4-H Leader Parent Federation Meetings. (Held on the 2nd Sunday evening of the month, 6 p.m. at the UW-Extension Office. Meetings generally last about an hour). --Computer access and proficiency with Microsoft word and e-mail is essential.

Vice President

The role is a two year term, the first year being a support to the President of the federation and the second year to moving into the President role. Duties include: Filling in for executive officers that may not be able to attend a meeting, including leading the Federation meeting if the President is not able to attend. Serve as chairman of the promotion committee. Assist in providing 4-H officer training.

Secretary

This position is a two year term. Duties include: Shall keep minutes of the meeting of the General Membership and Federation Board meetings. The secretary shall work with the Extension Office in getting out special correspondence and communications as necessary.

2016-2017 4-H Calendar Year Re-Enrollment Reminder!



Registration for all 4-H enrollments are done online at https://wi.4honline.com. All fees will be collected at the <u>club level</u>. An adult 4-H leader will not show "actively" enrolled until enrollment is submitted and "<u>accepted"</u>. A 4-H member will not show "actively" enrolled until <u>all</u> fees have been paid to and "<u>confirmed"</u> by your club leader and subsequently turned into the Extension Office to be "<u>accepted</u>". A \$5.00 late fee applies to all <u>re-enrollments</u> received by the Extension Office after November 15th deadline.

4H ONLINE Re-Enroll Members/Leaders September

GETTING STARTED

To get started with the re-enrollment process, go to https://wi.4honline.com and log in with your family email and password. (*If you do not remember your password, contact Cindy at the Extension Office, 637-5276. A temporary password will be sent to you.*) On the family home screen, click on the orange button labeled **Continue to Family**. On your Member/Volunteer list, find the family member you wish to re-enroll and click on Edit next to their name.

RE-ENROLL

At the bottom of the next screen, click on the button for Enroll for 2016-2017.

If the youth is over 17 years old, a box will appear asking if you wish to enroll as a youth or an adult. If the youth is graduating from 4-H and wants to continue as an adult leader, then choose **Enroll As Adult**, otherwise select **Enroll as Youth**. (Note: Additional steps must be taken and completed such as participating in the Volunteer Orientation class before someone can be accepted as an adult 4-H Leader.) You will now see the Personal Information that you entered when you first enrolled. Look over the information and make any corrections. If the youth was in 12th grade last year, you must select the grade for this year, either **Post High School Education** or **Not in School**. When you are done, click on **Continue**. Next is the Additional Information screen where you will need to accept the agreements and answer the Photo Release and Accommodations questions. Click **Continue** when done. The Health Form for members is optional at enrollment, but you could be asked to complete it in the future if you attend any events that require one. Click **Continue** when done. On the Participation -> Club screen, confirm the correct club is listed. If you serve in a volunteer role (but not as a project leader) click on **Edit** and select the volunteer type. Click on **Update** to save the change. Click on **Continue** when done. On the Participation -> Projects screen, confirm all the projects you are enrolled in are listed. Add any missing projects. If you are dropping a project, click on **Edit** for that project and then click on **Delete**. After making sure all your projects are listed correctly, click on **Submit Enrollment**.

Interested in becoming an 4-H Adult Volunteer? Great! Please see the quiz question and answer regarding steps needed to complete the enrollment process.



Question—I'm new to 4-H and have enrolled in 4honline. I'm good to go, right? **Answer**— No! Enrolling in 4honline is a starting point. Now you need to go back to 4honline and complete the mandated reporter training. (Make sure to print the certificate of completion!). Now call the Extension office to schedule a VIP (Volunteers in Preparation)

class. (Formally known as Volunteer Orientation).

Why does this matter? Without being an official 4-H volunteer you have no liability protection. It puts you at risk!

We had an informational session one evening and then took an afternoon to put that information to work while we hiked at Esofea Park. Both days we had about 8 members and we all learned so much. Thank you to those that took time out of your busy schedule to attend. I also want to commend all of the 4H members that entered photography in the Vernon County Fair. I saw some great photo entries!

A recap of my 4-H Photography In Focus Lesson—Preparing an exhibit

When you enter a photo exhibit at the county fair, you'll be showing the public, and the judge, what you've learned. Make your exhibit the best it can be. Here are my top 10 tips:

- 1. Don't worry about the type of camera you use. You can take interesting, wellcomposed photographs with any camera.
- 2. Hold your camera steady.
- 3. Get close to your subject. Fill the viewfinder.
- 4. Watch the background behind your subject. Keep it simple.
- 5. Place your subject off center, which is more interesting than in the middle of your
- photo. This is called the "Rule of Thirds."
- 6. Use leading lines to lead your eye to the subject.
- 7. Include something in the foreground that "frames" your subject within the photo.
- 8. Follow Vernon County Fair Mounting Requirements: correct photo size, board, matting, and adhesive.
- 9. Follow exhibit layout rules: no distracting artwork, photos mounted straight, title and captions clear and simple
- 10. Provide technical information: type of camera, type of film, and setting details.

Thank you and here's hoping our project members and families are able to get out and enjoy the trails this fall!



Registering for an event on 4honline



OVERVIEW

Registrations for some events are done in 4HOnline. This document walks you through registering for an event.

FINDING THE EVENT

Log into your family account and look at your member list. Scroll to the bottom and find the section titled "Register A Member In An Event". Select the name of the member you want to

register. Then select the event. A series of boxes will appear at the bottom of the screen. Click on the "Register" button.

REGISTERING FOR THE EVENT

On the next screen you will be asked for specific information related to the event. This may include t-shirt size, cabin or seminar choices, etc. Any required fields are in bold. Click on the "Continue >>" button. If you missed any required fields, you will get an error message and the missing fields will be highlighted. Verify your choices and click on the "Check Out >>" button.

On the Payment screen, the only selection is County/Club 4H Check. Click on the "Select Payment Method" button.

On the Confirm screen, check the box agreeing to the Pay By Computer Terms and Conditions. Click the "Confirm Order" button.

On the Finish screen, you can print your entry.

Follow the invoice instructions for submitting payment.





Making Choices between Food Needs and Food Wants

Food needs: Basic food choices that are needed for health

Food wants: Foods you'd like to have, but could survive without them-often convenience foods.

Get more for your food dollars:


- Plan meals and make your shopping list. •
- Think about your food needs first, then make choices from your food wants list if you have enough funds to purchase them. Example—Food needs: Fruits and vegetables in

season, whole chicken and oatmeal. Example—Food wants: Pre-made fruit smoothies, meat that is pre-cut or instant oatmeal in individual packages.

- Limit food wants that are low in nutrients but • high in fat and calories. These are "once-in-awhile" foods.
- Try to limit convenience foods when planning meals.

Santa Fe Stuffed **Potatoes**



- 4 medium potatoes
- 1 cup black beans (drained and rinsed if canned)
- 1 cup salsa
- 1 cup corn (canned or frozen)
- 1 cup low-fat shredded cheese

TIP: Reduce preparation time by cooking potatoes in the microwave for 15-17 minutes.

- 1. Preheat oven to 425°F.
- 2. Scrub potatoes and prick with fork. Bake for 1 hour or until cooked through.
- 3. Stir together beans, salsa, and corn in a saucepan about 10 minutes before the potatoes are done. Heat over medium heat until simmering.
- 4. Remove potatoes from oven. Cut in half lengthwise on plates. Spoon bean mixture over the top of each potato.
- 5. Sprinkle 1/4 cup cheese over each potato.

What's Cookin' - November-December Recipe From :Cindy Daniels, UW-Extension 4-H Administrative Assistant Parmesan Chicken Bake

Ingredients

2 tablespoons olive oil

2 cloves garlic, crushed and finely chopped 1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes, or to taste

6 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves

2 cups prepared marinara sauce

1/4 cup chopped fresh basil

1 (8 ounce) package shredded mozzarella cheese, divided

1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese, divided 1 (5 ounce) package garlic croutons

Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Coat the bottom of a 9x13 inch casserole dish with olive oil, and sprinkle with garlic and hot red pepper flakes. Arrange the chicken breasts in bottom of the dish, and pour marinara sauce over chicken. Sprinkle basil over marinara sauce, and top with half the mozzarella cheese, followed by half the Parmesan cheese. Sprinkle on the croutons, then top with the remaining mozzarella cheese and remaining Parmesan cheese. Bake in preheated oven until cheese and croutons are golden brown and the chicken is no longer pink inside, about 35 minutes to an hour, depending on the thickness of your chicken breasts.

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
